
ounded in 2006, Maths Week Ireland is an annual all-island celebration of mathematics. In partnership with over 50 institutes of higher education and other organizations, Maths Week organizes a week-long festival of events in schools and public venues throughout the island promoting positive attitudes towards mathematics.

Cross-community and cross-border participation is an essential part of Maths Week, with young people across the island participating in games and activities designed to cultivate an enjoyment of maths.

In the aftermath of the pandemic, Maths Week identified an increasing need for accessible and interactive programming in primary schools, particularly in Northern Ireland and the border counties. With Partnership support, the organizers successfully piloted a Travelling Maths Fair for 13 primary schools in counties Derry, Donegal, and Tyrone. The participating schools reflect the diversity of modern Ireland, serving students from varied national, religious, and socioeconomic backgrounds.

To solve the complex challenges facing Ireland today, the next generation will need this type of creativity, collaboration, and mutual understanding. The Fair brought together these students giving them a unique opportunity to share space and resources, collaborate, and achieve common goals. Through the universal language of maths, the students connected with one another, shared positive experiences with mathematics, and celebrated their successes together.

Kicking Into Gear

Propelling Irish Athletes Toward U.S. College Success

rowing up in Glasnevin, Dublin, Matthew O'Brien was struggling in school and uncertain about his future. "I wasn't really a big fan of school," he recalls. "I didn't know what I wanted to do after, so I put to the side." At one point, he even considered dropping out.

Then he discovered Leader Kicking, a program offering young Irish athletes training in American football and a shot at a college education in the United States. For Matthew, this changed everything. "It gave me a new lease on life, a new goal," he says. Through the program, he found purpose and confidence—qualities that have pushed him to focus both academically and athletically.

Founded with key support from the Partnership, Leader Kicking honors Ireland's sporting traditions by helping young athletes translate their skills in Gaelic football, soccer, and rugby into those used by kickers in American football.

> Beyond training, the program assists participants in navigating the complex recruitment and application process for U.S. colleges.

Though the program is still young, it has already demonstrated tremendous success. In 2023, Leader Kicking's first two student-athletes graduated from U.S. colleges, each with master's degrees. This year, five athletes from Leader Kicking earned full scholarships to universities including Boston College and Rutgers.

For Matthew, who is currently exploring multiple college options in America, Leader Kicking offered more than just The coaching and guidance I received was life-changing. I improved my skills and gained the confidence to pursue my dreams. I strongly recommend any young lad give this a go. It opens up amazing opportunities.

football skills—it brought a newfound confidence that permeates every area of his life. "If I had adversity in my life before, I'd shy away from it," he admits. "Now, I feel confident—on the field and off."

With a roster of over 1,000 aspiring future student-athletes representing all 32 Irish counties, Leader Kicking is poised to continue building athletic and educational ties between Ireland and the United States for years to come.

Opening Doors for Ireland's Next Generation

Motivating students to achieve their full potential, the Greaney Family Bursary program transforms students' lives in Synergy Founder and CEO David Greaney's native Limerick.

 hen Partnership Board Member David Greaney left Limerick in February 1996, he felt well-prepared to take on the exciting challenges ahead in his new hometown of
 Boston. "I received a wonderful education in Ireland,"
 David said, first at Thomond Community College
 then known as St. Nessan's – and subsequently at University College Dublin. Now an established businessman, David has never forgotten the critical role of his early education at Thomond Community College in ensuring his future success.

Located in Moylish, a disadvantaged area of Limerick City, Thomond Community College serves low-income students and their families. With encouragement from dedicated staff and the wider school community, the hard-working students at Thomond have achieved great success in all areas, from sports and the arts to leadership and scientific research.

Eager to support this next generation of talented Thomond students, David said, "A great education opens up so many doors and provides opportunities that many people don't have. I wanted to give back to this great school that gave me so much and recognize academic success and effort across all year groups."

Therefore, in 2016, David worked with the Partnership to establish the Greaney Family Bursary program, which awards \$30,000 annually to support Thomond students. While many school awards focus on older students, the Greaney Family Bursary program recognizes the top five achievers in each year group, with bursaries ranging from \notin 500 for 1st Year pupils to \notin 2,000 for graduating students. The annual bursary awards incentivize all Thomond students to reach their full potential – and the impact on the school community has been transformative.



As soon as the program was announced, the principal recalled students lining up to enter the library after school to complete their assignments. A tangible reward for academic excellence, the Greaney Family Bursary program has motivated all Thomond students to set and achieve higher goals, giving them a renewed sense of purpose and creating a culture of self-confidence and achievement within the school.

The bursaries have also had a genuinely life-changing impact on individual recipients and their families by alleviating financial hardships and encouraging students to pursue their dreams, both inside and outside of the classroom.

"I am incredibly passionate about music and play on a keyboard that I got for Christmas 6 years ago. I cannot afford lessons but still I work on it every day because I love it. I'll pay for a new keyboard and put money towards college with this scholarship. I would've been waiting years to see money like this normally. I cannot thank you enough."

At this year's awards ceremony, recipient Aimee Aherne, who is now in her 2nd year at the University of Limerick, described the impact of her award, saying "The Greaney Family Scholarship has opened up many doors for me, and I look forward to a future in clinical psychology, thanks to the foundation it has helped provide."

Having walked through the doors opened to him by his education at Thomond Community College, David is determined now to hold them open for the next generation. Reflecting on the success of the Greaney Family Bursary program so far, David said, "It is the most impactful giving that my family and I do, and it has been a privilege to see the impact that these awards have had over the past seven years."

The Partnership is proud to support the continued success of the Greaney Family Bursary program and its tremendous impact on some of Ireland's brightest students.

Building Bright Futures For Northern Ireland's Students

hrough both his own educational journey to law school in New Jersey and his time in Northern Ireland at the end of the Troubles, Stephen McCabe developed an enduring belief in the transformative power of higher education to improve individual lives and bring peace to societies in conflict.

However, Steve recognized that higher education is out of reach for many students in Northern Ireland, particularly those from underrepresented or economically disadvantaged backgrounds. In conjunction with the Partnership, Steve established the McCabe Family Endowment, which funds two annual scholarships for disadvantaged students from Northern Ireland to pursue a bachelor's degree at Queen's University Belfast or Ulster University.

As universities across Ireland implement access programs that offer comprehensive academic, financial, and social supports, the McCabe Family Endowment similarly enables talented students to take full advantage of all that a university education has to offer.

Without the added pressure of tuition fees, these students truly thrive in their studies, acquiring new skills, building connections with peers and mentors, and creating brighter futures for themselves and their communities.

The McCabe Family Endowment reflects Steve's longstanding commitment to ensuring that higher education is accessible for all. The Partnership is proud to support Steve in honoring his family's deep Irish roots in Counties Monaghan and Cork by creating this endowment. His generosity today represents a long-term investment in Northern Ireland's future that will benefit students for years to come.

stablished in 2022, following the amalgamation of Galway-Mayo,
 Sligo, and Letterkenny Institutes of Technology, Atlantic Technological
 University has rapidly grown to be Ireland's largest university outside of
 Dublin, with over 26,600 students, 2,600 staff, and a curriculum spanning

600 programs. In November 2023, St. Angela's College joined ATU as its ninth campus, marking another milestone in the university's development.

With the challenges and opportunities of Ireland's northern and western coastal region, ATU represents a new phase of possibility.

As Dr. Orla Flynn, ATU's inaugural President, explains, "ATU is dedicated to shaping the future of the west and northwest, positioning our university as a hub of education, innovation, research, and economic uplift."

She continued, "By building skills and knowledge within our region, we aim to attract inward investment and drive sustainable growth. Through our presence across the region, we will help to develop the west and northwest by offering our students quality education that will lead to meaningful careers without having to leave the area, as so many had to over the decades."

This year ATU launched its strategic plan which describes five "guiding lights" that will shape the direction of the university over the next four years: Enabling Education, Engaged Research, a Connected Ecosystem, Organisation Transformation, and Sustainability for the Future. These Guiding Lights build on the University's vision statement, mission and values, and are the themes which underpin the structure of the strategic plan.

Chair of the Governing Body of ATU, Maura McNally, SC added, "The five guiding lights illuminate our path toward becoming an internationally renowned university that enhances the quality of life in our region and creates a sustainable future for all."

To meet the evolving needs of students and employers alike, ATU recently introduced new ambitious programs including veterinary medicine and pharmacy. These are a testament to the growing confidence in the young university.

ATU is also committed to supporting disadvantaged schools in the region through the Department of Education's Delivering Equality of Opportunity in Schools (DEIS) program. ATU's Access and Widening Participation offices work closely with DEIS schools across Donegal, Sligo, Galway, and Mayo to provide mentoring and tailored educational projects.

For Irish American Partnership members, the journey of ATU is more than just a story of growth—it's a testament to the transformative power of education and international collaboration.

IMPACT ON THE GROUND
