Cooking Up Skills for Life

O'Connell Secondary School prepares students for life beyond the classroom.

O'Connell Secondary School serves more than two hundred boys in the heart of inner-city Dublin, many of whom face significant socioeconomic challenges long before they enter the classroom. Teachers identified a growing need within this diverse school community—to equip students with practical life skills, especially around food preparation, nutrition, and self-sufficiency.

“Many of our students have never had the chance to learn how to cook a simple, nourishing meal,” said Principal Liam Newell. “Basic cooking and food preparation skills build independence, confidence, and well-being—tools they will carry long after they leave school,” he continued.


Yet the school lacked a proper space to teach these essential skills. Determined to change that, Principal Newell applied for Partnership funding to transform an unused science lab into a fully functional home economics classroom.

The new classroom is a safe, warm, purpose-built space where students learn to prepare meals and understand nutrition. By taking on new challenges in the kitchen, these young men not only develop culinary skills, but also cultivate a sense of confidence and self-reliance.

But **perhaps the most powerful part of the classroom is what happens around the table.** Cooking becomes a way for students to connect, share a meal, and feel part of a supportive community. Says Principal Newell:

“This is about far more than a kitchen, it’s about belonging, dignity, and community.”

Thanks to you, the Partnership is able to support schools like O'Connell Secondary School by creating spaces where young people can learn, connect, and truly thrive.

Expanding Access *To Music* *Education*

Through its *Strings Attached* program, the Royal Irish Academy of Music is creating new opportunities for talented young musicians.

In one of the Royal Irish Academy of Music's (RIAM) rehearsal halls, the sound of bows on strings and last-minute tuning fill the air. As conductor Cillian O'Breachain assumes the ready position, members of the Junior Strings Orchestra come to attention, eager to begin their rehearsal.

Among the skilled musicians rehearsing with Junior Strings Orchestra are twenty-four students from four local primary schools in Dublin, all of which have been designated high-need by the Irish government. Having excelled in their schools' introductory music programs, each of the students hoped to further their music education. However, without access to instruments or the financial resources to pay for private tuition, these talented young musicians had few opportunities to continue their training.

Driven by a core belief that talent deserves opportunity, RIAM established its *Strings Attached* program. Over the course of three years, each participant receives tuition-free lessons and performs with their peers in the Junior Strings Orchestra.

For the students, the educational and performance opportunities provided by *Strings Attached* are transformative, helping them to flourish both musically and personally. As participants learn new compositions and improve their musical capabilities, they also grow in confidence, develop teamwork skills, and reap the benefits of hard work.

Strings Attached has ensured that young people from disadvantaged areas have equal opportunity to pursue their interests and achieve success. Whereas music might have become an abandoned childhood hobby for many of these students due to lack of resources and access, *Strings Attached* has enabled participants to develop their talent, overcome challenges, and enjoy experiences that set them up for future success.

Hands-On Learning in Galway Bay

Atlantic Technological University is training the next generation of teachers and fostering care for Ireland's precious blue spaces.

A cold wind whistled across Galway Bay as over one hundred primary school children, families, and university students gathered on the beach. Atlantic Technological University (ATU) students had transformed the local strand into a living lab, using the natural landscape to deliver learning experiences that encourage care for coastal spaces and marine life among Ireland's youngest learners.

This community beach day was organized by Dr. Rita Melia as part of the **Developing Ocean Literacy in Early Childhood** project at ATU. Created for students studying Early Childhood Education and Care, this unique program prepares Ireland's next generation of teachers to educate primary school children about their natural environment in a safe, age-appropriate way.

Guided by their professors, ATU students regularly visit the local beach over the course of several months to develop hands-on activities that will engage school children and teach them to understand and care for Ireland's coastal ecosystems.

For the trainee teachers, the beach day is an opportunity to deliver lessons in a real-world setting, while the children get to explore a new environment, learn about Ireland's natural landscapes, and, most importantly, have fun.

A New Pitch for Big Dreams

An astro-turf project at Scoil Mhuire Loughgar, County Westmeath, celebrates the school's long-standing sporting tradition.

For much of its history, Scoil Mhuire Loughgar has been known for its vibrant sporting culture, with students eagerly taking part in physical education lessons, Gaelic games, and more. Recently, the Scoil Mhuire Loughgar community celebrated its Gaelic football and hurling teams, both of which were victorious in the 2024 Cumann na mBunscoil Championships.

By participating in the wide range of athletic activities offered at this rural primary school, two hundred students develop connection and camaraderie, cultivate discipline and resilience, and learn healthy habits.

Despite the school's rich sporting tradition, Scoil Mhuire Loughgar has never had adequate outdoor athletic facilities. The school's existing pitch becomes waterlogged and unusable in cold, wet weather, and the surface is uneven in places, which raises the risk of injury to students and limits their access to physical education lessons and team training.

The local community fundraised to build a new all-weather astro-turf pitch at the school. With the project well underway, Principal Niall Brennan applied for Partnership funding to ensure the completion of the pitch. The Partnership awarded a grant to Scoil Mhuire Loughegar to support the community's efforts and get the astro-turf project over the finish line.

The new pitch will provide a safe outdoor space at the school where students can enjoy physical education lessons, active play, and recess throughout the year – rain or shine. The astro-turf pitch will also significantly expand training opportunities for Scoil Mhuire Loughegar's athletic teams, ensuring continuous skill development, high-quality coaching, and increased participation.

Now only weeks away from completion, **the new pitch is already enriching the school community.** “Sport has always been a cornerstone of life at Scoil Mhuire Loughegar, and our students can hardly wait to use the new pitch,” Principal Brennan said.



Partnership member Larry Furlong has family connections to the area and also expressed his delight, saying, “I’m thrilled to see this project come to life. It’s wonderful to be able to support Scoil Mhuire Loughegar in this way.”

Inspiring Tomorrow's Female Leaders

SistersIN is Northern Ireland's pioneering mentorship and skills development program.

The girls in my class really seem to struggle with confidence, social anxiety, and self-esteem," said one Belfast educator.

Studies show that teenage girls' confidence levels decline dramatically between the ages of fourteen and eighteen. In Northern Ireland, only twenty-three percent of eighteen-year-old girls describe themselves as confident, and teachers notice the effects in their classrooms. For these young girls, SistersIN is the boost they need.

SistersIN empowers teenage girls across Northern Ireland by equipping them with the skills, confidence, and networks they need to lead with purpose. Its signature Leadership Program is an 8-month skills development course designed specifically for teenage girls in their junior or senior year of high school.

Throughout the program, participants attend intensive leadership workshops and work collaboratively on a project that will benefit their school or community. From supply drives for local homeless shelters to mental health support groups for their peers, the girls develop a sense of pride and accomplishment in responding to the needs of their communities, all while improving their leadership, teamwork, and project management skills.

Each participant is also paired with an experienced female professional who provides mentorship throughout the Leadership Program. **This year marks a particularly exciting milestone for SistersIN as First Minister Michelle O'Neill and Deputy First Minister Emma Little-Pengelly have joined the Leadership Program as mentors.**

Two students—Clodagh from St. Pius X College in Magherafelt and Sophie from Strathearn School in Belfast—will benefit from their one-to-one guidance over the course of this academic year.

“Supporting the next generation of female leaders is something I feel very strongly about,” said First Minister Michelle O'Neill. “I look forward to sharing my experiences with Clodagh, while also learning from hers. This is an exciting journey for us both.”
